


Halifax is home to one of







Nova Scotia's wine country is shaped by the sea and is the only place on earth that produces **Tidal Bay wines**.

Nova Scotia has a long and rich tradition of growing grapes for wine that dates back to the 1600s, when this was one of the first areas to cultivate grapes in North America.
